STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

Objects

The Parochial Church Council of St Bride (the PCC) has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the church: pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The PCC is a corporate body established by the Church of England. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure and is a registered charity no. 1131311. PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish, including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent.

The Trustees' have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when considering the Charity's objectives and activities.

Trustees, Trustee Appointment & Trustee Training

The PCC met six times during the year with an average level of attendance in 2014 of 71% (2013: 75%). The Rector and Churchwardens are ex-officio Trustees, as are the Deanery Synod Representatives. A further 15 members are elected, a third of whom stand for re-election every three years. As at 31st December 2014, there were two casual vacancies. The following members and officials were elected and appointed at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting held on 30th April 2014 and elected or co-opted at subsequent meetings of the Council.

ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

Overview

The PCC reported a deficit of £48,456 for the year. A budget deficit of £40,659 had been agreed to cover the anticipated costs of the Interregnum and re-decoration of the Rectory. Several financial challenges throughout the year were offset by prudent expenditure during the Interregnum and the PCC's decision to let out the church flat at a commercial rent.

Our New Incumbent

The Venerable David Meara retired as Rector of St Bride's in April 2014, and remained as Priest-in-Charge until the end of July. After a brief Interregnum, the Revd Canon Dr Alison Joyce was appointed, and took office at a Service of Institution, Induction and Installation on 3rd November 2014.

Inspire!

The PCC continued to raise funds for the remaining phases of the Inspire! Appeal, and held events to promote the Appeal throughout the year.

Personal Commitment

Tax-efficient giving remained strong and was 3.5% higher than the previous year. A legacy of £5,000 was received from the Estate of Colin Stanley. The PCC is extremely grateful to all who support financially the church, but also wishes to thank those who give their help in kind – the large army of volunteers who man the shop, help out at services, run guided tours and keep the church open on Sunday afternoons.

Commercial Support

Donations through the Church Rates scheme decreased from £50,198 to £41,343. As reported in the 2013 Trustees' Report, the biggest contributor had unexpectedly withdrawn funding, a decision which proved to be permanent as far as the Church Rates scheme is concerned. However, after discussion, the firm kindly agreed to contribute £10,000 as a corporate donation, and other corporate giving was maintained. The PCC nevertheless agreed that it should place less reliance in future on Church Rates and would, instead, seek to secure ongoing funding agreements with the larger companies within the parish.

Media Links

The fifth annual Media Commemorative service took place on 5th November 2014, when we were honoured to welcome the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd & Rt Hon Justin Welby, as our preacher. St Bride's also hosted the 150th Anniversary Service for the Journalists' Charity, once again demonstrating the church's position at the spiritual heart of the industry.

City Livery Links

The PCC has continued to work closely with the four Livery Companies with which it has close links: the Marketors, Stationers, Turners and Spectacle Makers.

Special Services & Events

St Bride's hosted numerous weddings, baptisms, memorial services, carol services and other special events, such as the EC4 Music concert, the Tom Olsen Lecture delivered to a packed audience by Nigel Farage MEP, a Come & Sing performance of Handel's Messiah and the annual Summer Party. The number of weddings held at St Bride's remains one of the highest in the Diocese of London.

Visitors & Tourists

The PCC was able, thanks to the generosity of volunteers, to offer weekly public and occasional private tours. The shop continued to flourish and made a surplus of £5,386 for the year.

Sunday Club

The new Sunday Club was launched in the autumn, and has proved an instant success, with children between the ages of 4 and 11 being invited to attend bible discussion, games, singing and prayers, and older children holding their own discussion and supporting the Club leader.

Safeguarding

The PCC has appointed individuals to the requisite roles and continues to abide by its Safeguarding Policy. As a result, the PCC is fully compliant with Diocesan requirements.

Database

The Database was delivered to the church office and underwent final testing in early 2015.

OBJECTIVES FOR 2015

- Review the Mission Action Plan as part of the Diocese of London's Capital Vision 2020 project
- Use better the warmth of the congregation and Guild in welcoming visitors to the church
- Support and grow the Sunday Club
- Continue congregational fundraising for the Inspire! Appeal
- Re-establish practical links with St Bride Foundation

Reserves Policy

It is PCC policy to maintain a balance on unrestricted funds (if possible), which equates to at least two months' unrestricted payments net of St Bride's Appeal income, equivalent to £85,000, to cover emergency situations that may arise from time to time. Due to deficits in 2013 and 2014 – the latter expected, the former unexpected – free reserves as at 31st December 2014 are taken to be the unrestricted funds of £71,904 (2013: £53,884).

Risk Assessment

The Trustees have identified the major risks to which the PCC is exposed and have implemented systems and controls in order to mitigate those risks.

RELATED PARTIES & CONNECTED ORGANISATIONS

The Rector and Churchwardens are the ex-officio Trustees of St Bride's Appeal and St Bride Organ Fund. The Churchwardens are also Trustees of the St Bride Worldwide Media Trust. These Trusts support the work of the PCC. During the year the PCC received grants totalling £177,716 (2013: £865,623) from these Trusts.

Tangram, a firm of architects of which John Smith is a partner, receives a monthly retainer to oversee the fabric needs of the Church and is also paid fees for special projects, including the Inspire! Appeal. In 2014 total payments of £16,032 were made (2013: £79,546).

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue to operate.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL OF ST BRIDE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

We have audited the financial statements of for the year ended 31 December 2014 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes numbered 1 to 14.

The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

This report is made solely to the charity's trustees, as a body, in accordance with section 154 of the Charities Act 2011. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charity's trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditor

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities, the trustees are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

We have been appointed as auditor under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and report in accordance with regulations made under section 154 of that Act.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors.

Scope of the audit of the financial statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charity's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the trustees; and the overall presentation of the financial statements.

In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Trustees' Annual Report and any other surrounding information to identify material inconsistencies with the audited financial statements and to identify any information that is apparently materially incorrect based on, or materially inconsistent with, the knowledge acquired by us in the course of performing the audit. Trustee

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Historical Cost Convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 together with applicable accounting standards and the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP). The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

b) Funds

General funds represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC. Restricted funds are those where donors have placed restrictions on the use of the funds. Designated funds represent funds which have been set aside out of restricted funds by the Trustees for a specific purpose. The accounts include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law.

c) Incoming Resources

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC. Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised only when received. Income tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is recognised when the income is recognised. Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement, the amount due is quantifiable and its ultimate receipt by the PCC is reasonably certain.

d) Resources Expended

Charitable activities includes the direct costs of the Church and its mission as well as costs incurred in support of these activities. Governance costs include audit fees.

e) Fixed Assets

Consecrated property and movable church furnishings

Consecrated and beneficed property of any kind is excluded from the accounts by s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 2011. Movable church furnishings held by the Rector and Churchwardens on special trust for the PCC, and which require a faculty for disposal, are accounted as inalienable property unless consecrated. Church furniture, gifted by the St Bride's Appeal in 2009, is depreciated over 25 years.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated at 10% on the straight-line method, with the exception of the podcasting and sound system equipment, which will be depreciated at 20% per annum. Where prudent, individual items of equipment are written off when the asset is acquired.

f) Operating Leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against the surplus for the year on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

g) Pension Costs

The PCC participates in the Church Workers Pension Fund (CWPF). The PCC is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities as each employer is exposed to actuarial risks associated with the current and former employees of other entities participating in the Scheme. A valuation of the Fund has been carried out as at 31 st December 2013 and additional contributions in respect of the shortfall in the Employer subpool of £9,800 per annum are payable until March 2015, after which time the Defined Benefit Scheme part of the CWPF will be closed to future accrual and deficiency payments will cease. On 1st April 2015, all qualifying members of staff will be enrolled in the CWPF's Pension Builder 2014 Scheme, as legally required by auto-enrolment legislation.

14. RELATED PARTIES & CONNECTED ORGANISATIONS

The Rector and Churchwardens are the ex-officio Trustees of St Bride's Appeal and St Bride Organ Fund. The Churchwardens are also Trustees of the St Bride Worldwide Media Trust. These Trusts support the work of the PCC. During the year the PCC received grants totalling £177,716 (2013: £865,623) from these Trusts.

In addition, during the year £5,000 (2013: £15,000) was paid by St Bride's Appeal for the cost of administrative services provided by PCC staff.

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
